At this meeting, there were ten members present. Several subjects were discussed.

EXPO 2009

Several comments were made:

- The accounting is incomplete because there are still bills to pay and the gate receipts from the Car Club have not been received. Around 100 tickets were sold for the BBQ. It is estimated that there were about 600 visitors.
- The flea market and craft sale were important. The flea market captivated the visitors' interest and is an important and unique addition. Also, the carding and spinning of dog and cat hair by Sylvianne Jobin, rug hooking by Rose Ange Hébert, and making ice cream by Mme Legault interested many visitors.
- The heat undoubtedly discouraged visitors and maybe even some exhibitors.
- Not many helped do the cleanup at the end, take down the tents, and take the chairs and tables back.
- Maybe we should hire some people to help with this work. Furthermore, we are all getting older.
- Maybe we should cut down on the advertising to pay for help.
- There are Scouts and other community groups who might be interested.
- Maybe we should buy a tent that is easier to erect and take down. (The tent cost \$6000 twenty years ago.)

INSURANCE

Our insurance costs about \$1150, \$450 for the Club and \$650 for the directors.

A recent court case could have an impact on all volunteer organizations. One of the defendants said that he had no part in the decision that caused prejudice, since he was absent at the time of discussion. However, the judge declared that he was a director and therefore responsible for the results of the decision, even if he was absent. A director is a member in good standing. So, it is not only the Board of Directors who could be subject to lawsuits, but also the members.

THE NATIONAL

The value of the engine has been increased from \$4000 to \$6000. So, there was a discussion on whether the engine was adequately insured. It was concluded that, given the risks, which are low, the engine is probably insured sufficiently.

EXPO 2010

The members noted that if there were no Expo, the Club would have no reason to exist. So, after discussion, the group decided to present another exposition in 2010. They therefore mandated the President to make a written request to the Municipal Council of Compton to have access to the Récré-o-parc.

There was a discussion regarding the date. Expo has always been held on the third weekend of August. However, in 2010, the two days – Saturday and Sunday- don't fall on the same weekend: the second Saturday and the third Sunday or the third Saturday and the fourth

Sunday fall together. It was decided to hold Expo on the third Saturday and the fourth Sunday, the 21st and 22nd of August in 2010.

There were several comments:

- Since this is municipal election year, the request should be made immediately because the councils meet between now and the end of September and do not sit in October during the electoral period.
- We need to revise our formula between now and the holidays and base our publicity in consequence.
- Activities such as sawing shingles and making water pipes are missing.
- A survey of the visitors should be done to determine what attracted them to Expo, maybe one in five.
- Maybe help from the Loisirs de Compton should be made.
- Maybe videos would interest the spectators. (This would require equipment.)

CHRISTMAS PARTY

There was a discussion if the members wanted a Christmas Party and if so, when and where. It was proposed to have one and to have it at the Coaticook Golf Club on Sunday, December 6th.

NOVEMBER 2009 MEETING

There were thirteen members present. Most of the discussion concerned Expo 2009 and Expo 2010. There were several comments:

- Cooperation with the Car Club is to our advantage.
- Their publicity was well done.

- There are other municipal publications where we could put our ad such as Barnston Ouest. There is also La Terre de Chez Nous.
- Few car spectators traversed to our show.
- Expo is a lost cause. It is too much for three or four persons to manage.
- Why do we put on Expo? For the fun. There are no young people, just old maniacs, there is little new, there is nothing new in the public's mind.
- Attendance is unlikely to remain stable. It is more likely to decrease.
- The site doesn't permit many activities, such as threshing and plowing. Displays must be active to attract spectators.
- We need new members – it is utopia to think that the Club will remain stable. The membership decreases continuously. The current membership is getting older.
- The price of a Model T has remained stable because some are lost every year. So, for a limited number, the price remains stable. This is why big collectors are selective.
- So, what do we do about Expo? We need a solution.
- Plowing attracts spectators. The younger generation doesn't know how to plow. In past times, a farmer was judged by his plowing – it was a question of pride. There were a dozen types of moldboards.
- To increase interest, a new avenue is needed. For example – a tractor pull.
- We should not import what happens in the States – the mentality is different here.
- In the past a plowing match attracted 500 spectators. Today, there are only about two dozen.
- The spectators stopped to watch what Mmes Jobin and Hébert were doing.
- There is nothing for women – they are not interested in tractors.
- In Iowa, there was a pavilion just for women.
- If the father and mother participate, it is more likely that the children will be interested.
- When a tractor is running, the crowd gathers around.
- Snowmobiles attract spectators.
- Gilles daughter dressed in Manga attracted attention as did Mrs. Mittner when she was dressed in Dutch costume.
- If we reinvent Expo, a member has some land available in Compton but spectators would have to be shuttled.
- It is too late to change for 2010.
- Members should talk to their spouses about this issue.

- The antique cars should be on the same site as we are.

INSURANCE

Thérèse Papineau, broker at Conway-Jacques, sent us a document which defines who an insured is. It includes:

1. The organization
2. All administrators and directors of the organization
3. All members of statutory or special committees, as well as all members of commissions, meetings, or boards created by the organization, exercising their functions
4. All volunteers and members or ex-members of the staff, paid or not, exercising their functions
5. The successors, legal representatives, the heirs and anyone having rights to property of the Insured referred to in paragraphs b, c, and d, as well as all legal representatives or those with inheritance rights of any Insured incapacitated, insolvent, or in bankruptcy
6. The legal or common-law spouse of the Insured named as a co-defender in a lawsuit against the insured uniquely because of the spouse status, including all claims for damages from the assets held jointly by the Insured and the spouse, or any transferred to the spouse by the Insured. This coverage does not include any claims arising from all wrongful acts, real or alleged, committed by the spouse of the Insured.

SLIDES

The President presented two sets of slides: one of the 2008 Kinzers PA show and the other on the 2006 Ely VT show at Ruth Driscoll's. The Kinzers show included photos of: threshing with

a horsepower and steam tractor, a sawmill, two steam trains serving the site, competitions, displays of tractors, trucks, and machinery. At Ely, there were photos of tractor display, collections of all sorts (antique tools, barbed wire, miniature boats, and many other articles), gas engines, threshing, baling with stationary balers, sawing at the Cook sawmill, shingle sawing, wood sawing. And there is the museum with collections of salt and pepper shakers, toys, dishes, beer cans, and many other articles. Also to be seen are the print shop, the blacksmith shop, the chainsaw collection, and dairy display. There is also the 40 HP Bessemer engine which is started from time to time. Ely is well worth a visit.

CHRISTMAS PARTY 2009

The Club held its' annual Christmas Party on Sunday morning, December 6th at the Coaticook Golf Club. Fifty people attended.

Dallas won the Trophy at Expo 2009 but wasn't present when the trophy was presented. The President then recognized the contribution of Lisianne Lapierre and Luc Grenier for organizing the BBQ last summer except for the meat. He also thanked Martin Dion for making contact with the Golf Club and making arrangements with them for the Christmas Brunch, He also thanked Mr. Brown and his team from the Golf Club for receiving the members and for the fine meal.

Then, the drawings for the door prizes began. This was a two-step process, the first being the drawing of the ticket to identify the winner. Dave Lord looked after the drawings. The first ticket was drawn by Dave Lord but thereafter each winner drew the next winning ticket. The winners then drew another ticket to identify the gift by matching the number on the winning ticket with that on the ticket taped to the gift. Gordon Barnett identified the gifts. One of the members had offered his land as a site for the show. However, there is no infrastructure such as water, electricity, and toilets necessary for such an event. The site also has to be prepared for such an event by seeding grass and mowing. There must also be a space for parking. There is also the insurance question. And permanent infrastructures can't be built on land zoned for farm purposes. Also, the current site is close to services such as restaurants and a service station.

What can be done give a new orientation to the exposition to maintain public interest?

Other comments:

- I want to show what I have and not be preoccupied with publicity.
- It is the same everywhere. There is a decrease in attendance at other shows of both the public and the exhibitors.
- The exhibitors should set up their exhibits in a different place to at least give at least the appearance of something new.
- Maybe the Flea market should be relocated on the site. (They want to be close to the entrance.)

There was a discussion on other sites for the brunch such as the Airport and the Cookshire Community Center. However, because of the space and the fact that the Club does not have to guarantee the number of participants, there is an advantage to going to Coaticook. SPECIAL PRESENTATIONS

LUC'S PRESENTATION

Luc Grenier made a presentation on a miniature boiler he is making. It measures about 30 cm in height. It has taken him several hundred hours to make, rebuild the valves to one seventy- second, and making parts with a lathe. He found brass rivets from a dealer in mediaeval artifacts. He described how he made some of the high precision miniature parts and very small diagonal holes. The boiler will be heated by a fondue stove. There was also a discussion on the thread type, the taps and dies needed, and where they can be bought. An interesting and spontaneous presentation.
